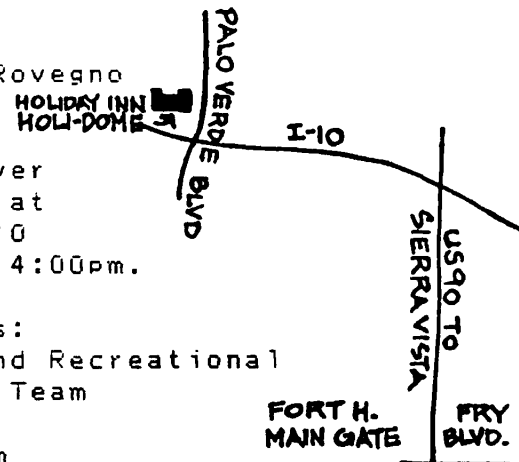

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE TRIVIA-O

Lee North put together a unique orienteering event. Participants had to find locations using a map and then answer a question or record an observation after following a set of instructions.

#### GENERAL MEETING

Five areas were discussed and decided on.

1. Survey Results- John Maier reported that last year's level of activity was acceptable and people wanted more Score-O's; Improve existing maps and find new sites; Reasons for missing meets: time conflicts 50%, lack of childcare 17%, dislike site 17%; Favorite Events: 2 day events, new sites, Lincoln Park night-O's, Mnt. Lemmon summer events; Least Favorite Events: Steepness of Bear Wallow, bad vegetation i.e. snin diggers at Helvitia.
2. Approved 1988 schedule of events.
3. Staffing Events- Two primary positions for every event: Meet Director and Course Setter. Meet Directors manage the event and delegate tasks for the day of the event. Course Setters will be responsible for the mapping and placing controls. Veters are important to preserve the integrity of courses.
4. Map Fund- Balance stands at \$500.00. A committee was appointed to consider best uses of the fund. First meeting Feb. 9th. More info at Greasewood on Sunday, Feb. 7th.
5. New ribbon designs using the club logo will be available after the current supply is exhausted.

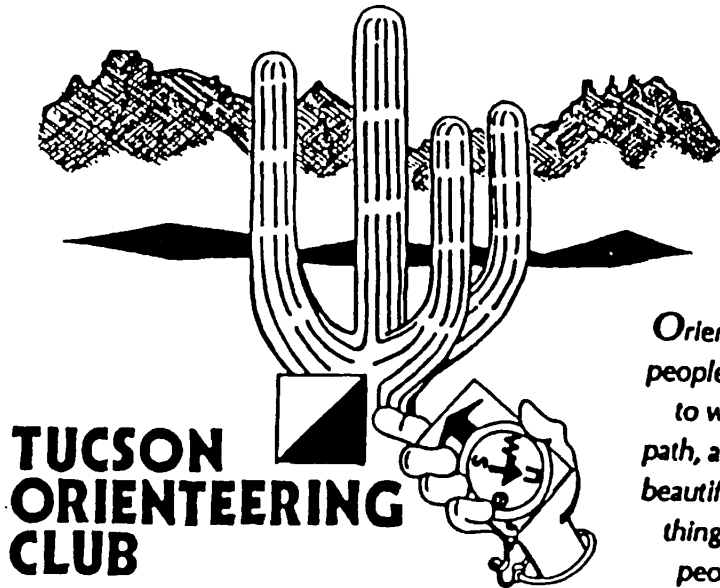
