## The Official Account of Helen Deluga's Amazing Colorado Triumph

Little triangles mean boulders, a squiggly line means a stream, unless, of course, it has straight lines on either side, in which case it's a ditch. Here I was sitting on a plan flying to Colorado trying to memorize funny IOF symbols. Imagine my relief Saturday morning when Warren Kossmann told me that none of the symbols would actually appear on the map. Of course, about that time he reminded me that the maps were 5-color. But these pesky details were cleared up in plenty of time (about 10 minutes before start time) and I was on my way in the Colorado Heartland Championship in Colorado Springs.

Saturday's course in Garden of the Gods, outside Colorado Springs was hot and desert-like. The scenery was often spectacular: ranging from huge red rock formations, wooded hills, narrow head-high gulleys to open grassy meadows. The map was very detailed and showed numerous boulders and small patches of vegetation and open space. Running the intermediate orange course, I often had trouble identifying which boulder, patch, or space I was looking at. It seems that others did also as there

were quite a few DNF's on Saturday.

Sunday's course was located at White Ranch Park outside Denver. The higher brought with it aspen groves and alpine meadows sporting Indian paintbrush and blue lupine. With a 2 hour drive from Colorado Springs and the memory of Saturday's 20 minute uphill hike to the start point, I made sure to leave plenty of time for travel. A long 40 minute hike to the start point made for a close start for me and a late start for many others.

Most people I spoke with liked Sunday's course over the troublesome Saturday course. It was generally easier to follow through less varied terrain. A network of trails provided some good handrails and made for easier going. The sighting of a few deer, including some of the junior variety, along with the beautiful scenery and cooler weather seemed to add to everyone's enjoyment.

The fun didn't end there. I found that even with my usual turtle's pace, there were enough DNF's in the small group I ran in that I took a 3rd place ribbon (with matching tote bag). Many of our southern Californian friends were there to share some of the glory of the day. Even a few surprised DNFers received ribbons!

Our absconding meet director was sighted at Sunday's meet. His truck had broken down on the way to the conference and he didn't show up until a minute past his start time. Of course, he ran anyway. He must have known that there was a bounty on his head as he disappeared soon after and was last seen heading east.

Meet directors and course setters are needed for many upcoming meets. If you haven't "done" either of these positions and want to become experienced, try being an apprentice to the director or setter. If you're interested, call Peg at 628-8985 and I'll put you in touch with the people in the know for that meet.

Remember the potluck at Keith's in March? Did you borrow from his incredible library of orienteering literature? He's ready to get it all back now. You can reach him at 577-0570.




