## GREASEWOOD PARK IN DECEMBER

A meet will be held Sunday, December 15, at Greasewood Park. This will replace the Catalina State Park meet that had been scheduled. There will be White, Yellow, and Orange courses. Wilkey Richardson will conduct a beginners' clinic at 9 a.m. Peg Davis will guide two map walks. The first, from 9:30 to 10:30, is geared toward White course orienteerers who would like to move up to Yellow courses. The second, from 10:30 to 11:30, is for Yellow course orienteerers who wish to move up to Orange courses.

Courses open at 9:30 and the last start time is 11:30. Courses will close at 1 p.m. To volunteer to help, call Peg at 628-8985 or Wilkey at 529-1105.

**Directions**: Take Speedway west to the intersection with Greasewood Road (there is a stoplight there). Turn south (left) on Greasewood and turn right at the park entrance, 0.1 mile. (It will be marked with an orienteering sign.)

Fees: \$4 per person for nonmembers; \$2 per person for members of TSN, GPHX, USOF, or SAHC. (No team rate.) Compasses rent for \$1. Safety whistles sell for \$1. Every person, all courses, all meets is required to carry some type of safety whistle.

**Check-In:** To insure that all are safe, everyone, whether finished with the course or not, must check in formally at Start/Finish before leaving the meet site.

**Newcomers:** Go directly to Registration; ask for instructions and introductory information. To allow time to register before attending the beginners' clinic, you should arrive between 8:45 and 9 a.m.

#### Schedule:

9:30 a.m. Map walk for Yellow course. Map walk for Orange course. 10:30 a.m.

11:30 a.m. Last start time.



Do you know which course is appropriate for you? There's more to it than just looking at the map on the "Which Course?" board and basing your decision on length and climb. On that board you will find an article by Karen Dennis which gives you a basic understanding of the prerequisites for each course, as well as what you can expect to gain from each.

Anyone not at the elite level would do well to at least read the description of the course you intend to do. If you do not understand the description, then you are getting in over your head and may not have a pleasant experience.

Below is a list of what I consider to be the main distinguishing points of the various courses.

White (easy course): For those with no prior experience other than the beginners' clinic. The course follows linear features (e.g., road, trail, wash) from point to point. All control features will be within sight of the linear features you are following. Compass use not required.


Yellow (easy course): Takes you away from the roads and trails, though these or other linear features will be nearby. Many controls will not be visible from the linear features. The Yellow orienteerer should have a basic understanding of contour lines and be able to identify the more obvious features (e.g., hills, ridges, drainages). Compass use not essential but helpful.

**Orange (moderate):** Does not follow linear features. The Orange orienteerer will use point features in addition to the terrain for navigation. Linear features and/or obvious terrain features should be about 100 meters away from control sites so as to make relocation relatively easy in case of error. Compass use required. Lots of route-choice decisions. Lots of variety in control locations.

Green and Red (difficult): Orienteerer is tested in use of all skills. Must use subtle terrain features for navigation to control sites. No linear features or obvious terrain features within 200 meters of control. Lots of route-choice problems, some long legs, strong penalty for error. Technically, Green and Red are equally difficult. Physically, Red is harder (i.e., longer, more climb).
