New Meet Site at Brady Wash

We will be breaking in another new map on November 15! The Brady Wash site is between Oracle Junction and Florence on SR 79 (see directions below). Although less hilly than the Silverbell site, the wash system creates some interesting orienteering terrain.

The usual five courses will be set: White, Yellow, Orange, Green, Red. Something for everyone!

Also, this is a joint meet with the Greater Phoenix Orienteering Club. We hope to have a good turnout from both clubs, since it won't be too far from either place.

Due to the lack of a suitable site, there will be no Club-sponsored camping.

As usual, volunteers are needed to run registration and timing tables, and to collect controls after the meet. Contact one of the meet directors, Pat Penn (326-2339) or Margrit McIntosh (795-3083) to offer your help. Remember, you can still compete before or after you do your good deed!

Directions: From Tucson, take Oracle Road (SR 77) to Oracle Junction. Turn left on SR 79. Drive northwest on SR 79 about 20 miles. At 0.6 mile north of milepost 111, turn right on Freeman Road (signed junction). Drive 4.3 miles east on Freeman Road to the meet site. Parking will be restricted to the right (south) side of the road. (If coming from the Phoenix area, take SR79 heading southeast out of Florence. Freeman Road is about four miles southeast of the Tom Mix Monument. Turn left on Freeman Road and follow the directions above.)

Fees: \$8/individual, \$10/team; \$5 discount for TSN, PHX, USOF, or SAHC members. Compasses rent for \$1. Safety whistles sell for \$1. Every per-

son, all courses, all meets is required to carry some type of safety whistle.

Schedule:

9:00 a.m. Registration opens. 9:30 a.m. Courses open. Beginners' clinic starts.

12:00 noon. Last time to start a course.

12 noon-2 p.m. Route choice re-

2:00 p.m. Courses close. Begin control retrieval—good orienteering practice, lots of help always needed. Volunteer before 2 p.m. with the meet director.

Check-In: To insure that all are safe, everyone, whether finished with the course or not, must check in formally at Start/Finish before leaving the meet site.

Newcomers: Go directly to Registration. Ask for instructions and introductory information. To allow time to register before attending the beginners' clinic, arrive between 9 and 9:15 a.m.

Route-Choice Reviews: Between noon and 2 p.m., the course setter or an advanced orienteer will discuss route choices with returning participants, probably near Start/Finish area.

A Planner's Plea

WE NEED VETTERS. First, let me apologise to the people on the Red course at Empire Ranch. I copied a control incorrectly onto the master map which you all copied, meaning none of you could find control number 1. This happened despite my re-checking the map board just before the event.

To put this into perspective—I have set controls for 10 days of orienteering in my life. Of those, six were in the UK where vetters (controllers, we call them) look over the setter's shoulder and check that the controls are in the right place, the descriptions are correct, etc. The other four were here in sunny Arizona.

So far I have made three serious errors when setting courses. All three took place in Arizona, with no vetter. At Redington Pass last year, I put one control in the wrong place and put the wrong control code on the descriptions for one course. Then I made the master map error at Empire Ranch.

I think the fact that no errors made their way to the competitors' attention while I was in the UK is a direct effect of having a vetter. I appreciate that the Club is having trouble getting people to take on jobs for the meets—I therefore suggest that we have a "limited vetter" who checks the following items:

Before the day of the event: check that the courses planned are reasonable, and in particular that the White and Yellow courses are not too hard. (I reiterate that the White course cannot be too easy.) Also, check that enough water will be available on the courses.

On the day of the event: check that the master maps, the map used for hanging the controls, and the control descriptions match exactly.

This job would take only a pleasant hour or so before the event and a few minutes on the morning of the event.

I see no reason why a limited vetter should be noncompetitive. Of course, if the vetter has more time, then he/she should try to check the locations of the flags (usually marked out in advance by the setter with tape) and become a noncompetitive runner.

Of my three serious mistakes, the limited vetter would have caught two. A real vetter would have caught all three.


Have you earned ribbons that you haven't received? Ribbons are no longer mailed with the newsletters. When they are enclosed, the newsletter must be sent by first-class mail. Ribbons are available at each meet for the winners to pick up. You are responsible for getting your ribbon.

Ribbons will be placed near Registration or Results in a box or envelope. They will be held for six months after a meet. If they haven't been picked up in that length of time, we will assume that you didn't want it, and it will be recycled.

Due to the large number of ribbons that were not picked up, and are therefore being recycled, I ask you again to please let me know if you don't care about receiving ribbons, or if you only want first-place ribbons. It will save me the trouble of making them and will save the club some money too.

Bizarre Event Problems



I've been involved in too many meets and seen all sorts of problems:

- (1) The last control not put out in a multi-day event. The embarrassed organizers had to quickly run with a control and put it into place, in front of the spectators.
- (2) Fallen trees completely covering a control and only the clipper (punch) could be seen. Most orienteers found it and went on—they thought I had been trying to make it trickier for them.
- (3) Controls moved by the criminal element—the control site was too near cannabis plots—and they came and removed it.



- (4) Control in a depression completely covered by water after a downpour.
- (5) A mapper had a 1:7500 basemap, which he thought was a 1:10,000. For printing, it was reduced to 67% to print at 1:15,000. In fact, the 1:7500 thus reduced printed at 1:11,250—the apparent km times were fantastic!



- (6) A cow got into the act: he completely licked, chewed, and spit out one control. It must have looked like a salt lick.
- (7) At one club event, the organizers ran out of maps and had to ask early finishers to allow their maps to be recycled to the later runners.
- (8) A control was blown 400 m downhill after a very windy night before the event.
- (9) All the courses had to be redrawn the night before the event when the pen originally used was found to be water-soluble.
- (10) An enraged bull, stung by bees near one control, chased competitors who tried to get near it.
- (11) A river on one course had become swollen and raging; racers were forced to swim it eight times to finish. (This event should have been cancelled.)


